

2019 West Virginia Coal Hall of Fame Banquet Celebrates 22 Years

Bill Raney, President, WVCA, welcomed everyone on behalf of the West Virginia Coal Mining Institute (WVCMI), and the West Virginia Coal Association (WVCA), to the 22nd induction ceremony of members into the West Virginia Coal Hall of Fame. The event was held on March 20 at the Embassy Suites, Charleston, WV as part of the Joint Meeting and there were 132 attendees present to hear Calvin Kidd give the Invocation.

After dinner, a special presentation took place prior to the induction ceremony. The very first copy of the new book, "**West Virginia Coal Mining Institute – a Short History" by Bill Reid,** signed by members of the Board of the Institute was presented to Royce Watts by Joe Pugh, 2019-20 President of WVCMI. Royce became Secretary-Treasurer of the Institute in 1995 and served the organization for 38 years. The book is dedicated to Royce and to the memory of his late wife Caroline.

Bill Raney then began the Hall of Fame induction ceremony. "In 1998 the leadership of the West Virginia Coal Association and the West Virginia Coal Mining Institute created the West Virginia Coal Hall of Fame and inducted the first class of West Virginia



leaders, who are listed in your program this evening," said Raney. "The photos of Coal Hall of Fame members reside in the Mineral Resources Building at West Virginia University in Morgantown, West Virginia."

The criteria for selection clearly distinguishes a large pool of dedicated leaders, who have made such significant contributions to the West Virginia coal industry. These criteria are:

- Must have made a significant contribution to the development and growth of the coal industry in West Virginia as evidenced by documented accomplishments, etc.
- Must have devoted a minimum of five years of his or her mining career directly related to the West Virginia coal industry; and
- Must have served as an operator, manager, owner, engineer, educator, or other major contributor to the growth and development of the West Virginia coal industry.

Raney said he was honored to be a part of the ceremony recognizing the Class of 2019 inductees and two inductees from the Class of 2018, who couldn't attend last year. He personally congratulated each one. He also thanked the Program Sponsors, and the Program Committee consisting of members of the sponsoring organizations for creating an excellent slate of technical experts for the Joint Technical Meeting, which was to take place the following day. The first two inductees were from the Class of 2018 and the last two comprised the Class of 2019

The first inductee, Frank Calandra, President and CEO, Jennmar Corporation and subsidiaries around the world, was introduced by Rodney Poland, who described Frank's golf exploits in Australia. Jennmar now has 500 employees in West Virginia and 1,500 employees worldwide.

Calandra thanked the Coal Hall of Fame committee for the honor. He first visited West Virginia in 1953 driving a truck for his Dad. He stayed the night in Summerville and the motel cost \$11 including breakfast. In 1972, he decided to build his first plant in Pennsylvania and was proud to have worked with MSHA to change the roof bolt specs. Later, he saw the great potential in West Virginia, as there were around 300 coal mines, and invested further. He said he wanted to thank all those who worked for him and paid tribute to everyone in all his companies. At age 81, he plans to work for another ten years!

Bill Raney introduced Joe Craft. Born in Hazard, Kentucky, Joe was an outstanding baseball player in his youth. He worked at Mapco then purchased them and formed Alliance Resources, which is a publicly traded, world-renowned organization and a major player in West Virginia. Alliance is the largest coal producer in the eastern U.S. and mines half the coal in Kentucky. Joe is the most humble and genuine man and has done things that no one will ever know to help others. He supports students to excel both at school and in later life.

Craft said that he has been around coal all his life. His Dad was an attorney with many coal clients. Coal people are so solid and such wonderful people. Coal has been good for this country and the rest of the world and we still have a major part to play, he said. indicating that he was sorry his wife, Kelly, could not be with him.

"I want to thank you all for everything you do in our great industry," said Craft. "I am honored to be here and I wouldn't be here tonight if it wasn't for our West Virginia team. They are the ones that provide the results and I'm glad to represent them for what they have done to make our company what it is. Thank you all for the great honor to be here and to be recognized."



Jim was always committed to each area of his life those being his church, family and jobs.

He mentioned his Italian immigrant parents, who impressed on him the importance of pursuing an education and working diligently, setting him an example themselves by working hard. He said that his success was due to many others too numerous to mention and hoped that he had had a positive influence on those colleagues that he had the honor to know and work with.

"May God bless you all and continue to bless the coal industry and the wonderful people that serve as stewards for this wonderful God given resource," he concluded.

Bill Raney said that Danny now lives in Blacksville and it's been six years since he retired as Senior VP, Norfolk Southern. More specifically, he became the leader of Pocahontas Land Corporation in 1995 and was involved in opening, overseeing, and defending more mining and timbering operations than anyone else in southern West Virginia. Under Danny's watch, Pocahontas Land managed well over 1 million acres of coal, land, and timber across seven states. This included multiple coal seams from steam coal to some of the finest met coal in the world.
